Dear Parents and Carers,

We celebrated Seachdain na Gàidhlig (World Gaelic Week) recently with primary pupils and pupils in S1 – S3 involved in a variety of activities encouraging their use and understanding of Gaelic. There were classroom experiences in Gaelic singing with Deirdre Graham, podcasting with Robert MacInnes from Radio Skye and map-making in the Assembly Hall with a giant map of Scotland. Listen again to the Radio Skye Seachdain na Gàidhlig special (first broadcast on Mid Morning at 11am on 27th February) to hear our pupils.

S2 pupils enjoyed a cultural excursion to Eilean Donan Castle and primary and secondary pupils welcomed members of the local community to a Gaelic coffee afternoon midweek. Everyone had the chance to get involved on Latha an Abairt na Gàidhlig /Say a Gaelic Phrase Day on Thursday – see our facebook page for footage of some of these. The whole week was rounded off on Friday with a ceilidh for primary pupils in the morning and for S1 – S3 pupils in the afternoon, featuring live music from Music School. Mòran taing to colleagues involved in organising the week and to everyone who came in to the school to support us to take part in Seachdain na Gàidhlig.

The Senior Charities Group had the great idea of having a Spring Clean Day last Friday 28th February which included a dress down day and the opportunity to get involved in tidying up areas of the school. The day included an invitation to 'spring clean your mind' by leaving your phone at home for the day. This is part of our focus on encouraging awareness of the impact of phone use.



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As I write, we have a group of pupils and staff who are currently taking part in The Global Day of Unplugging (Thursday 6th March from 1.10pm to Friday 7th March at 1.10pm). We had a significant number of pupils who were willing to unplug and leave their devices for 24 hours and we are looking forward to hearing their reflections on their experiences.

Finally, you may recall that Storm Éowyn prevented Music School students from travelling to take part in a performance at Celtic Connections earlier this session. John Swinney, First Minister of Scotland, was one of the disappointed audience members on that night so we were delighted that he came to visit the school and the National Centre of Excellence in Traditional Music earlier this week. Music School students provided Mr Swinney with a guided tour of the Music School and spoke with him about the value of their experiences as students of traditional music and the visit finished with a special performance of part of the set which should have been performed at Celtic Connections.

On the last three pages of this newsletter there is a reminder of our school values; our classroom code and our mobile phone policy. These are displayed in classrooms throughout the school and referred to by teachers to support positive engagement.




Women in STEM!

The Higher Physics students were learning about elementary and composite subatomic particles this week. They successfully "made" Mesons and Baryons - the smarties represent different quarks. They combined the quarks/ smarties together on a cupcake to create composite particles known as Hadrons (think Large Hadron Collidor LHC).

Can you name the Hadrons they made by using the colour code?

The antiparticle is opposite in charge and is represented with a line above the quark. An up quark = u and an anti-up quark = ū.

All particles have an anti- particle.

A neutron = udd and an anti-neutron = $\bar{u}d\bar{d}$.


And finally, thank you to the public who were at the castle - for putting up with us during the time we were there! Tapadh leibhse!

- Play a pivotal role in ensuring clear communication


SMT:

- Engage their child to take an active part in the Plockton High Community.


How to follow the Classroom Code



Mobile Phones Policy


During the school day phones should be on silent & headphones should not be on display.

They should be kept in a school bag when:



The only exception is when a teacher allows the use of phones in the lesson If a phone is confiscated, it will be referred and sent to the PT for collection at the end of the school day

You may use your phones safely and responsibly in school:



Rationale

- 1. To enable the school to develop an ethos of digital citizenship that leads to safe and responsible use of mobile technology.
- 2. We want to positively embrace mobile technology whilst helping protect staff, partners and young people from possible harmful consequences of misuse. .
- 3. We believe that we should be preparing young people to use modern technology in a safe and responsible way, therefore there is not a complete ban on mobile phones.
